## **2020 Town of Georgia Dedications**

While many Georgia residents kept socially distant throughout the majority of 2020, two very special dedications were held:

### **Peter & Frances Mallett Municipal Recreation Area**

June 20, 2020: on a sunny afternoon, the Georgia Beach was quietly renamed as the *Peter & Frances Mallett Recreation Area*. Peter and Frances were longtime residents of the Town of Georgia who generously gave their time and expertise across the town: from the foundation of the modern library and the historical society to participation in town government - including the initial purchase of the town beach.

At a small ceremony held to reveal the new signage on Georgia Shore Road, Georgia Historical Society member Colin Conger described Peter as someone who had “his fingerprints on everything and also had a vision for everything.” Peter pushed for the 10-acre property purchase, that would later become the recreation area, during Georgia’s 1973 Town Meeting Day.

While the community will miss Peter and Frances, we honor all the ways they faithfully served our town: Selectboard, School Board, Librarian, Historical Society, Local Genealogy, History books of Georgia, and many more. Their gifts to the town are endless.

### **Eric Nye II Georgia Fire & Rescue Station**

December 14, 2020: during a cold, snowy evening, the Georgia Fire & Rescue Station was warmly dedicated to former Chief Eric “Ric” Nye II. 2020 marked Ric’s anniversary of 50 years of dedicated service to the Georgia Fire Department, 18 years of which he was the Chief of this department. Ric is the longest running Chief that the department has had.

While many are aware of his accomplishments within the fire department, his other Georgia-related accomplishments are numerous. He was a Select Board member for 30 years, the Road Commissioner for 30 years, the Vermont League of Cities and Towns Person of the Year, and he ran several years as a Georgia First Responder. He also was instrumental in the building of the Fire and Rescue Station, the Veterans Memorial, the Jimmy Center and the sand and salt shed. Ric’s selfless contributions to the Town of Georgia are numerous. However, more importantly, Ric made these contributions while being a husband, dad, grandfather, and local business owner. Congratulations Ric and thank you for everything you have done for the Department and the Town of Georgia.

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION 2021:

**Dog Licensing:** Licensing will take place at the Town Office starting January 1, 2021. They will be considered delinquent after April 1<sup>st</sup> and a late fee will be assessed. The fees are as follows: \$10 for spayed/neutered, \$17 for non-spayed/non-neutered.

**Property Taxes:** Payment is due on October 15, 2021. After this date, there is a collection fee of 8% applied to the tax bill and interest charged at 1.5% for every month thereafter.

**Green Mountain Passport:** Georgia residents over 62 may get an application for a Green Mountain Passport at the Town Clerk's Office.

## Independent Auditor's Report

To the Select Board  
Town of Georgia  
Georgia, Vermont

### ***Report on the Financial Statements***

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Georgia, Vermont as of and for the year ended December 31, 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town of Georgia, Vermont's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

### ***Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements***

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting as described in Note 1; this includes determining that the modified cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

### ***Auditor's Responsibility***

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

### ***Opinions***

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Georgia, Vermont, as of December 31, 2019, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting as described in Note 1.

***Basis of Accounting***

We draw attention to Note 1 of the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinions are not modified with respect to that matter.

***Other Matters******Other Information***

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Georgia, Vermont's basic financial statements. The budgetary comparison information and the combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. These schedules have not been subject to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on them.

***Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards***

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated August 11, 2020, on our consideration of the Town of Georgia, Vermont's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town of Georgia, Vermont's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Town of Georgia, Vermont's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

**Georgia Conservation Commission**  
*Established March of 1993*

With the COVID-19 virus ravaging the US and beyond during the year of 2020, many folks found themselves discovering, or rediscovering, the Great Outdoors. Be it fishing, hunting, hiking, skiing, or just getting out to get some fresh air, there was record interest in the outdoors across the US during 2020, even right here in Vermont, where fields, forests, and waterways are never far off. So, in looking back at the year, it's fitting that the Georgia Conservation Commission had a year of high activity!

The Georgia Conservation Commission is a seven-member board of townspeople, who volunteer their time and effort to support the core mission, which is: "To preserve, protect, and enhance the native plants, animals, and their habitats in the town of Georgia Vermont, for current and future generations." Commission members have donated countless hours of service over many years to the town. Because of these efforts, the Town of Georgia now can boast of 4 properties conserved, protected, and available for public use. These include the Russell Greene Natural Area along Deer Brook on Rt. 104A, the Henley Webster Town Forest - a 10-acre wooded parcel along Bovat Road, the beautiful 162-acre Silver Lake Woods north off Silver Lake Road, and 69 acres on the northern edge of town, next to Lost Pond, north of Conger Road.

The Conservation Commission partnered with the Georgia Public Library this past summer to install a Story Walk in the Russell Greene Natural Area. We hope to expand this offering next summer.

The newest, and increasingly popular property is Silver Lake Woods, which sports several hiking trails, and access to scenic Silver Lake. The Commission has made numerous improvements to the property in 2020, including constructing two foot bridges along hiking trails, clearing windfallen trees, trail marking, maintaining and improving the larger trail system, replacing a large, failing culvert along the Class 4 road into the property with a stream water crossing, and creating water bars along a portion of the road to mitigate further erosion. Several signs around the property were added, including one detailing the history of the property, while doubling as a dedication to the late Fran Moses, whose generosity helped make land conservation possible in the town. The Commission also recently installed an informational visitor kiosk near the southern entrance to the property. Silver Lake Woods is seeing markedly increased usage, and we have talked to numerous visitors who have expressed gratitude for the work we've done, and for having such a nice park in town for free use. We have seen hunters, fisherfolk, swimmers, hikers, and even mushroom foragers utilizing the property. The Commission would like to thank Dan Harvey, who generously donated his time and efforts to trail maintenance, and bridge construction this season. Thanks Dan!

Silver Lake Woods is chiefly a regrowth forest, having once been farmland. As such, over the years, numerous invasive plants and shrubs have out-competed native species, and gained a foothold. An intern with the Vermont Land Trust created an invasive plants inventory of the Silver Lake Woods property. In order to reduce these species' impact on the property, and mitigate potential threats to human health (such as ticks, skin rashes, etc), the Conservation Commission applied for, and received, a five thousand dollar grant from the Vermont Land Trust, to eradicate/mitigate such species as Wild Parsnip, Japanese Barberry, Buckthorn, among others. We have an action plan in-hand from a certified Vermont Forester, and the Commission is currently in the process of soliciting suitable partners to help perform the eradication work in 2021.

In addition to the invasive species mitigation grant, the Commission also received a so-called “tiny grant” from the Association of Vermont Conservation Commissions (AVCC) for \$250, which will help support the continued furtherance of our core mission. Thank you AVCC!

In 2020, we were saddened to learn that one of our most dedicated and long serving members would be retiring from the Conservation Commission. Kent Henderson had been on the Commission for twelve years, and many of the success stories we can report over these years were in no small part due to his tireless efforts. In an effort to thank Kent, the Commission petitioned the Vermont House of Representatives to recognize his dedication through an official Resolution. To our surprise, and certainly his, they did so, and Kent was presented with the award by Commission Chair, Suzanna Brown on October 19th.

Resident Peter Mazurak joined the Commission in 2020, and has already proven to be a very engaged and helpful team member. We also learned that long-time Commission member Rob Meader will be moving out of the town of Georgia this year, which will sadly disqualify him from further serving on the Commission. He has been a very active member for many years, and we will miss him.

## Zoning Administrator's Report 2020

The Georgia zoning office continues to be active issuing permits, assisting applicants, facilitating records research, providing information to the public, investigating potential zoning violations, and assisting the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

A total of 106 building permits were issued this year, an increase from 75 in 2019. New dwelling units decreased from 15 in 2019 to 11 in 2020 and consisted of 10 new single-family residences and one accessory apartment. Three sign permits and three home occupation permits were also approved. The remaining building permits were issued for accessory structures including garages, sheds, decks, porches, pools, fences, and residential additions. In addition, three boundary line adjustments and one seasonal conversion permit were administratively approved.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment conducted four public hearings granting a conditional use permit for an event venue, a home industry permitting a custom butchering and raw dog food manufacturing operation, a commercial sign exceeding 25 square feet in size, and an amendment to a previously approved conditional use permit to add accessory structures to an existing manufacturing facility.

In 2021, the Town of Georgia will, in conjunction with the adoption of new development regulations, transition from a Planning Commission/Zoning Board of Adjustment model to a Planning Commission/Development Review Board model. A Development Review Board is the local land use board that holds quasi-judicial proceedings (hearings) to review land use applications. Once adopted by the Selectboard, the DRB assumes all development review functions previously held by the ZBA, which includes appeals of decisions of the administrative officer, variances, and conditional use permits. The DRB also conducts all land use review functions previously held by the Planning Commission including site plan and subdivision review. The adoption of a DRB streamlines the permit review process and eliminates possible conflicts between two land use review boards with overlapping authority, thereby increasing the efficiency and effectiveness of both the Planning Commission and the DRB by allowing them to specialize in either development review or planning. With the inception of the DRB, the Planning Commission is able to focus on the town plan and bylaw revisions and other long-term planning functions including capital budget plans and natural resource planning.

## PLANNING COMMISSION NOTES 2020

Your Georgia Planning Commission, along with Northwest Regional Planning Commission, has been working on a rewrite of the Town of Georgia Development Regulations throughout 2019 and 2020. The completed draft was forwarded to the town attorney in late December 2020 for review. Special thanks go out to Zoning Administrator, Cindy Deyak, and Planning Commission members Greg Drew and Tony Heinlein for joining me in numerous weekday subcommittee meetings with NWRPC staff. Following the attorney review and prior to the adoption of the updated Town of Georgia Development Regulations, publicly warned hearings will be held by the Planning Commission and Selectboard.

The Selectboard has proposed the creation of a Selectboard appointed Development Review Board (DRB) to conduct reviews of future applications for Site Plans, Boundary Line Adjustments, Conditional Uses, Variances, appeals of Zoning Administrator decisions, and Subdivisions. At that time, the Zoning Board of Adjustment will be dissolved. The Planning Commission will be tasked with creating Interim Zoning Bylaws, Town Plan and Development Regulation rewrites and planning studies. This change will happen when the new development regulations are adopted.

This year, the Planning Commission submitted draft Interim Zoning Bylaws and a draft private road and driveway update, entitled, "Town of Georgia Private Road and Driveway Standards", to the Selectboard. The Selectboard adopted both documents.

Longtime member and past chair George Bilodeau stepped down from the Planning Commission during 2020. George's many years of experience as a dedicated member of the commission will be missed. Emily Johnson and Edward Simon brought youthful enthusiasm to the Planning Commission following their appointments to the Planning Commission by the Selectboard.

We have had a busy year during trying times and look forward to life returning to more normal circumstances. In closing, as your planning chair, I would like to thank you for your patience at meetings. We have tried to conduct them in an orderly manner, allowing everyone to participate.

The past year with COVID-19 has been different for everyone, creating many new challenges. The Fire Department has faced those challenges head on, having to make numerous operational changes in an effort to keep everyone safe while still being able to respond to emergencies and maintain required training. We have shifted our business meetings to Zoom meetings along with some of our training. Hands on/in person training has been limited for much of the year due to restrictions limiting size of gatherings. Maintenance nights have been divided into extra nights to limit the number of firefighters at the station at one time while still making sure trucks and equipment are response ready. We do temperature checks each time we enter the building, including when responding to emergencies. We have limited trucks that seat 6 or 7 firefighters to no more than 4 firefighters to keep some spacing while wearing masks at all times. Lastly, we have increased disinfecting procedures and have had to add extra personal protective equipment for call responses. Probably the most disappointing thing to us is having to close the fire station to the public. We always look forward to having public events, fire prevention at the school, or people just stopping by for a visit. All of that had to be put on hold. We look forward to when we can get back to some normalcy.

In 2020 the Fire Department responded to 146 calls, down 19 calls or 11.5% from the previous year. Most of the difference appears to be a drop in motor vehicle crashes from 55 last year to 35 this year. While I would love to think that people are driving safer, in reality it is probably directly related to decreased travel and people staying home for most of the year. I would like to thank all of our members for their continued dedication and service to the Fire Department, especially in this year of change. I would also like to thank their families for their continued support.

This past fall we replaced the chassis on our rescue body 1999 Ford F450 regular cab truck and refurbished the body. The new chassis is a crew cab allowing for more firefighters. The body has compartments and a 4 foot by 8 foot slide out tray to allow it to also have the capabilities of a pick-up truck. The tray is especially helpful when picking up hose and equipment after a fire to be brought back, cleaned, and returned to service. The cost of the chassis replacement and body refurb was approximately half of what it would have been to replace the existing 1999 truck.

This past year, Ric Nye reached an incredible milestone. He has served the Fire Department for 50 years. He is only the second person in Department history to do so (Please see related story in the front of the book regarding this milestone). Thank you to Ric for his years of service and knowledge. He has been a mentor to many. The fire department also gained Jonathan Callan as a new member in 2020, we welcome him to the department and thank him in advance for his service. The Fire Department also lost former auxiliary member Lois Webster. We appreciate

her previous service to the department. If you are interested in becoming a member, please reach out to any member for details.

Thank you for your continued support of the Georgia Fire Department.

## 2020 Georgia First Response

To the Residents of the Town of Georgia,

Georgia First response is a Vermont Licensed First Response agency through the Department of Health and EMS office, that currently provides advanced level care to the residents of the Town of Georgia. Georgia First Responses membership is made up of 10 certified members ranging from EMT to AEMT and are fully equipped to handle all types of medical related incidents.

In 2020 we were dispatched to a total of 278 incidents, varying from lift assists and motor vehicle accidents with injuries to the more severe incidents such as cardiac arrests. Our providers continue to provide the best care possible to our community even during these tough times with the presence of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Last year Georgia First Response was awarded the First Responder service of the Year award by the Vermont EMS Office. We also became the very first and only, First Response Agency in the state to be recognized as a Pediatric Safe Community. This recognition is awarded to EMS agencies in VT who voluntarily apply for recognition and meet the program requirements. Requirements include specific pediatric equipment, submission of pediatric calls into the state database (SIREN), participation in EMSC surveys, have a designated pediatric care coordinator, provide appropriate pediatric training, and provide community outreach programs.

We continue to offer the **Art Carroll EMS Scholarship** to those individuals interested in taking an EMS course and potentially starting their careers in the EMS field. This year we awarded the Art Carroll EMS Scholarship to Georgia Fire Department member Landon Baker. Landon is continuing his Fire and EMS education at Lake Regions Community College in Laconia, NH, where he works and lives at a local fire house providing EMS and fire coverage to the area. He continues to serve the Town of Georgia while on school breaks.

As always, the scholarship is funded by the Georgia Fire and Rescue Association through funds raised during community events such as the annual Calcutta and Soccer Jamboree. We encourage anyone who is interested in taking an EMS course to reach out to **Andrew Dunsmore, EMS Chief** of Georgia First Response to receive more information about applying for this scholarship.

We would like to thank the community of Georgia for the continued support of our organization, and we hope everyone has a happy, healthy, and prosperous year.

## **Assessor's Office—Town Report 2020**

The Town of Georgia Assessor's office is responsible for maintaining the Grand List on an annual basis. The Grand List is utilized for setting the Municipal and Education Tax Rates. Each year the office continues to update individual assessments as a result of new building permits, on-going construction projects and subdivisions. The Assessor's Office is also responsible for maintaining the tax maps which are a valuable tool in Listing, Zoning, Planning and Public Works.

2020 has proven to be a challenge as the office suspended interior inspections and made changes to manage the office consistent with CDC guidelines. Due to the volatility in market conditions, the Assessor's office has been carefully tracking all sales and has briefed local state legislators about potential challenges for the next few years.

The final Grand List for 2020 is \$624,284,640, an increase of 1.0% from 2019. The residential categories continue to grow due to new construction of dwellings. No major commercial changes were made in 2020. In early 2021 the town was formally notified of the intent of Perrigo Nutritionals to expand its manufacturing footprint in the Georgia Industrial Park. If the project comes to fruition it will likely have a substantial impact on the Grand List in the future.

The Assessor wants to remind property owners that the Vermont Homestead Declaration needs to be filed annually. The form number, HS122, remains the same for 2020 tax year. It can be filed with the Vermont state income taxes or on-line at the State of Vermont tax department website ([www.vermont.gov](http://www.vermont.gov)). The HI144 (Household Income) also needs to be filed in order to receive a property tax credit claim from the State of Vermont. There were a small percentage of property owners who did not file the HS122 in 2020 as was the case in previous years.

The Assessor's office is open only by appointment until further notice. Access to all Lister records can be obtained by calling our office for electronic copies or making an appointment with the Town Clerks office where up to date data may be viewed.

Currently due to the Covid-19 situation we are maintaining our office hours with a staggered staffing arrangement. We can email assessment records and other data if possible. To contact our office please visit the town web site at [www.townofgeorgia.com](http://www.townofgeorgia.com) where contact information is available.

The Assessor is available on Thursdays from 10 am to 1 pm and by appointment.

## **Georgia Public Library 2020 Annual Report**

The year 2020 called us to be nimble in discerning the essential. At Georgia Public Library, we listened, studied and reached out to respond to the changing needs of our community. We are grateful to the many folks who support our work, including Ray Bouffard of Georgia Market for his generous donation of supplies that helped make curbside service possible.

Lead Library Assistant, Sara Walker produced 40 virtual Storytime videos, which had a total of 2,212 online interactions, our gracious volunteer Ben Ebert created 38 virtual Lego Challenges with 1,092 online interactions, and Summer Reading virtual Programming had 1,124 online interactions. A treasured feature this year is recordings of community members reading books for Storytime. These are saved for posterity--thank you all!

We distributed 101 Grab and Go craft kits in November and December 2020. Forty-one Summer Reading packets went out to families and 134 packets of seeds were shared from our new seed library, thanks to Deb Snell and High Mowing Seed Company. We partnered with the Georgia Conservation Committee to bring a Story Walk to the Russell Greene Natural area. This popular activity had 567 engagements!

We placed 242 direct calls to patrons to express our care and let them know we are still available for community, books, audio-visual items, and more. We added 71 new patrons and renewed library cards for 42 additional patrons.

Our staff, Jeremy Little and Sara Walker created instructional videos to help the community use their library card to access Overdrive for online books and audiobooks, and Universal Class for job skills training. This information is found on our website.

Digital readership increased almost 90% in Georgia over the last two years, mirroring national trends. In response, and given pandemic realities, we redirected 25% of our budget for adult books to e-books and e-audiobooks, this reduced or eliminated waitlists on popular items for Georgia patrons. Additionally, we added two new e-readers to the collection. These may be borrowed for a period of three weeks by Georgia Public Library card holders.

We added an additional 795 new “physical” items to our collection, including books for children, young adults and adults, as well as audiobooks.

Interlibrary Loan continued with 655 books borrowed from other libraries by Georgia residents and 667 books lent to other libraries by Georgia Public Library.

The Georgia community requested more anti-racist and diverse reading materials. We responded by adding a number of new books to the collection. We have also added a search feature “Diversity” to ensure that these works are easier to find in our catalog.

We developed and implemented a Continuity of Operations plan based on data available from the VT Department of Health. We implemented a quarantining procedure as recommended by best practice in library-specific scientific research and as guided by the Vermont Department of Libraries. We installed a plexiglass shield around the circulation desk, and increased the distance between patron computer stations, with time limits and sanitation procedures to offer the safest possible environment for our community and our staff. We have a new air purifier. We follow health protocols closely.

We served our patrons with 1,379 checkout items via window and curbside service. Book bundles of librarian selected picture books are available- a patron simply asks for books about whatever topic they please. We assemble the set of ten and have it ready at the window. We are always happy to advise readers on a great new book!

Our wifi is easily accessible from the parking lot, and we are working to improve signal strength early 2021 through a VT Public Service Department program for external routers. Picnic tables are available for outdoor seating and wifi access in good weather.

The Giving Tree at Georgia Public Library partnered with June Waite, of the Georgia Community Food Shelf, to match community generosity with families in need. This year required a different approach and folks donated money to buy gifts. This approach was welcomed and declared a success by all.

Our new website went live January 4, 2021. This was an in-house work-in-progress for much of 2020.

Look for our new interactive Children's wall when we reopen to patrons! Installation is anticipated Spring 2021.

## **Georgia Historical Society Names Sara Nye Vester Volunteer of the Year**



Sara Nye Vester, a lifelong resident whose green thumb, huge heart and tireless commitment to Georgia enrich our community, is the Georgia Historical Society's Volunteer of the Year for 2021.

Sara was born and raised on the family farm, cultivating her horticultural and creative talents while working at Nye's Berryland and Weeds & Things gift shop, both on Plains Road. She continues to garden on a grand scale, growing a wide variety of hot pepper plants, tomatoes and myriad other vegetables and flowers and generously distributing gifts from her harvest – both fresh and preserved – to neighbors far and wide. She also plants and tends the flower garden at the Georgia Municipal Offices, as well as the gravesites of a dozen or more relatives, friends and community members at the Georgia Plains Cemetery. Included among them are the baby Mable Eloise, who died over two centuries ago and has captivated Sara ever since she first spotted the carved lamb atop her headstone while on a break from Sunday School at Georgia Baptist Church.

Going above and beyond in service to others is Sara's hallmark. Through her role as an LNA with Franklin County Home Health, Sara was recognized with the "Patricia A. Dean Make a Difference Award" for doing just that in caring for elderly and ailing clients in our community. Her dedication to those in need goes beyond her profession; Sara simply steps in to help her neighbors wherever she can and whenever she can. The Georgia Historical Society has benefited from her tireless work as a hands-on director. Each summer season, she curates and sets up the exhibition in the Brick School Museum on Ethan Allen Highway, and she also coordinates and manages the monthly program of speakers. She is a former trustee of the Georgia Plains Baptist Church, and led the area's Christmas Bird Count for many years. Sara's love of nature is evident in the way she tends to all creatures great and small.

With this award, Sara has earned the designation as one of Georgia's most essential and memorable citizens. The Georgia Historical Society was founded in 1975 to preserve and promote knowledge about the people, places, stories and artifacts that comprise the history of our town.

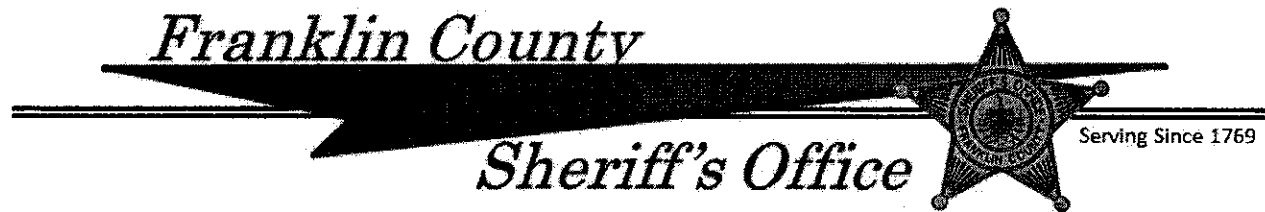
## **A Future Home for Georgia History**

At the end of 2020, the Georgia Historical Society took ownership of The Old Town Clerk's Office at 3949 Ethan Allen Highway. The donation of this building was made in memory of a former Georgia resident, the late Steve Williams. Constructed in 1948, it was the first permanent home for the town's records and daily business operations, and was made possible by individual donations totaling \$2,100. It's fortunate that the original plan to locate in the Town Hall was scuttled, because that building burned down in 1952. In 1989, the Town Clerk's Office moved to its current location.

Extensive improvements will be needed to make the building suitable to house the Georgia Historical Society's vast collections of genealogy, photos and other historical archives. It is our hope that today's townspeople will support this renovation project through their deeds and dollars. It will take us a couple of years, but we intend to open as a research library with public visiting hours. Stay tuned for updates on the Georgia Historical Society's Facebook page.

## 2020 YEAR IN REVIEW

This has been a very unique year for the citizens of Franklin County as it has been for the Franklin County Sheriff's Office. Seemingly at times facing insurmountable obstacles the Sheriff's Office constantly had to adapt to new approaches in performing our duties as police officers. The one constant that has not changed was the Sheriff's Office commitment to community policing. It will always remain as the cornerstone as to how the Sheriff Office operates.

As many of you know, Sheriff Departments must generate their own revenue. While this can be challenging in good times, it has been made even more difficult due to COVID 19. Many scheduled road construction traffic details were cancelled along with county events like June Dairy Days, Lake Carmi Triathlon, the Franklin County Field Days and other regular details usually contributing to help fund the Franklin County Sheriff's Office operating costs.

The Franklin County Sheriff's Office consists of 33 deputies. During this past year, the Sheriff's Office contracted for police services in the following towns, Georgia, Richford, Enosburgh, Sheldon, Franklin & Fairfax while providing property regular property checks for the Lake Carmi Campers Association. Deputies also patrolled the Lake Carmi State Park during the summer of 2020.

2020 did have some bright spots for the Franklin County Sheriff's Office. Two deputies were blessed the arrival of their first born healthy children. Additionally, the Franklin County Sheriff's Office was awarded the St Albans Town Policing Contract. This contract will allow the Franklin County Sheriff's Office to increase its number of deputies as the new St Albans Town contract starts July 01, 2021. This is, as with all of our towns, an opportunity to partner with the St Albans Town community while promoting safe neighborhoods and addressing quality of life issues.

## Annual Report for the year 2020

As most residents might guess the FCIDC report for calendar year 2020 is focused on the impacts and the ongoing recovery from the Coronavirus Pandemic. During the month of March 2020 everyone became aware of a new vocabulary; we learned words like Coronavirus, COVID, social distancing, quarantine, mandates, droplets, essential and on-line schooling. Along with our new vernacular came mandates to shut down schools, restaurants, construction and all other small non-essential businesses among others. People were encouraged to stay home and to work from home; the State's economy began to struggle soon after the shut-down.

FCIDC was on the front line of communicating with businesses about State and Federal programs. Over the years FCIDC has accumulated a long list of business emails and we added many more during the pandemic. We used the email list to share regular updates and pertinent information with business owners throughout Franklin County. We dispersed information to all Franklin County Municipalities and asked them to share with their local residents. The communities of Enosburg, Swanton and St. Albans City have specific individuals working on economic development and we maintained regular communication with all of them.

During the months of October and November when Federal dollars were being administered to States to assist businesses FCIDC was active in the Navigator program where all of the State's 12 Regional Development Corporations, of which FCIDC is one of the 12, received funds to connect businesses with the needed technical assistance vendor. The vendor assistance could cover a wide range of business topics such as creating an on-line presence, or improve their social media platforms, or be more proficient with their bookkeeping or creating a new product line. Across the state, hundreds of businesses received Technical Assistance. This past fall the Agency of Commerce and Community Development (ACCD) administered a second program which was ReStartVT business grants. Through this program grants were offered to businesses that had experienced significant loss of income over their 2019 business year. ACCD received in excess of 2000 ReStart applications and all of them needed to be reviewed to confirm they did in fact show a loss, their financials were up to speed and they were in fact a registered business. The Regional Development Corporations reviewed 43% of those applications.

This past summer FCIDC partnered with Northwest Regional Planning and applied for EDA and USDA grants, of which we received. These grants are focused on COVID economic recovery over the next two years. FCIDC in conjunction with local vendors will be producing a number of on-line videos to assist our local businesses with financial literacy and e-commerce. In addition to helping existing business, we believe that there will be a high level of interest for people to start their own businesses in the coming year so we will be offering "Start Your Own Business Workshops" so that those individuals have a basic overview of what is needed.

I would like to extend a huge thank you to all of the Franklin County residents who made the effort to continue to work, essential and non-essential employees and thank you all for supporting local businesses. Some of the small businesses stated they had one of their best Christmas seasons in memory. It appears that we still have 7 or 8 months to go before we are out of the woods and if that is true, I would just ask everyone to continue to follow the guidelines, check on your neighbors and support your local businesses. Let's hope for a great 2021.

Thank you to the Town of Georgia, on behalf of the Friends of Northern Lake Champlain (FNLC). Your generous annual donation has enabled us to continue our work and expand our message and is especially appreciated this year because of the devastating effect that Covid safety precautions had on our fundraising educational event revenues.

As you know, our existing projects include efforts that help to reduce pollution into Lake Champlain. We are partnering with progressive municipalities like Georgia, private residents, and good conservation farmers to construct water quality structures and practices.

In 2020, the Lake Champlain Basin Program provided the FNLC Green Infrastructure grant, which supported construction of **a rain barrel system at GEMS** to support STEM teaching. Georgia students are learning a simple method of stormwater treatment that they can apply at home.



Watershed Consulting Associates is making satisfactory progress on the Georgia Shore Stormwater and Shoreline Assessment which is being supported by a LCBP grant. Next steps call for community involvement in the selection of highest priority projects to be brought to design for state and/or federal grant support. Public outreach will begin when the pandemic subsides.

In conjunction with Watersheds United of Vermont (WUV), the first of several stormwater treatment and infiltration projects planned for the head of Deer Brook Gully was installed at the back of the parking lot at Interstate Auto Service. The newly constructed gravel wetland shown below, collects and stores stormwater runoff and filters sediment before minimal excess is discharged slowly through a riser at the lower end of the structure.



As this article went to press, FNLC was notified by the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) that it has been awarded a \$400,000 LCBP supported grant to construct upland stormwater practices at the head of Deer Brook Gully. Gravel wetlands, catch risers, and a deep sump catch basin are planned to address stormwater treatment from Route 7/104a and the Interstate Exit 18 exchange. Restoration/Stabilization in the gully will be addressed by upgrading the closed drainage system, including an innovative drop manhole system and strategically placed log steps in the gully channel. Work plan development and construction is anticipated to occur over a three year period.

# Northwest Vermont Solid Waste Management District

## 2020 Annual Report

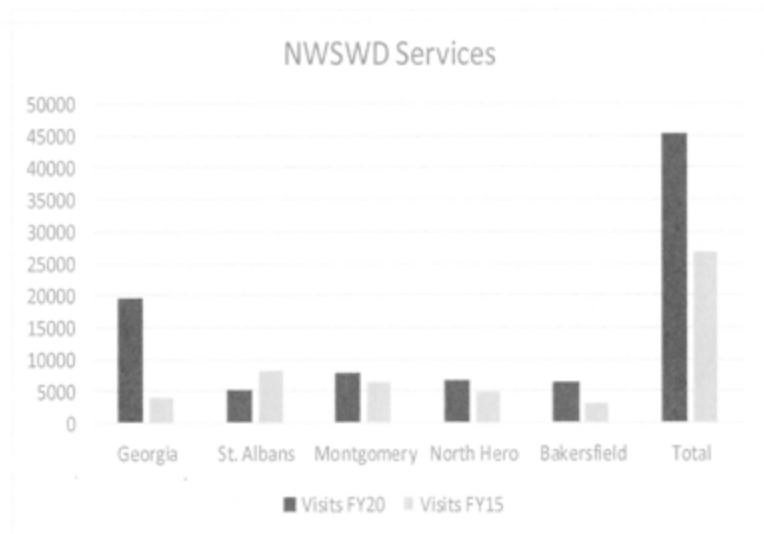
The Northwest Solid Waste District's (NWSWD) mission is to help its residents reduce waste, recycle what it produces, and reduce the toxicity of what ends up in the landfill. 2020 provided many challenges for the NWSWD and its employees. However, waste management is an essential service. Our employees adapted, improvised, and worked hard to keep our drop-off sites open and keep people safe.



The NWSWD's efforts resulted in the average NWSWD resident sending less waste to the landfill than last year! Waste diverted was recycled or reused and helped conserve resources as well as keep toxic materials out of Vermont landfills. This year the average NWSWD resident made 4.5 pounds of waste and sent just 3.3 pounds of waste to the landfill per day. The national average is over 4.5 pounds landfilled per day. Way to go!

District services offered at our drop-off sites provide all district residents with convenient access to programs to divert waste from the landfill.

- This year over 45,000 visits were made to NWSWD sites. That is almost 20,000 more than just five years ago!
- District operations diverted 1,599 tons of waste from the landfill in 2020!
- Collected almost 36 tons of hazardous material from 1399 households through our Household Hazardous Waste program.
- Our Close the Loop compost program experienced incredible growth and we collected 653 tons of food scraps from businesses, institutions, and residents to be turned into compost. That is more than two times the amount of food scraps collected in 2015!

# NORTHWEST REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

## Town Report, 2020 - Georgia

Northwest Regional Planning Commission (NRPC) is a multi-purpose governmental organization created by the municipalities of Franklin and Grand Isle Counties. NRPC implements a variety of projects and programs tailored to local, regional and statewide needs. All municipalities in the region are entitled to equal voting representation by two locally appointed members to the Board of Commissioners.

### 2020 GEORGIA TOWN PROJECTS

- Provided guidance to the Town Emergency Management Director to update and adopt the Local Emergency Management Plan which will help the Town be prepared for future disasters.
- Coordinated substantial revisions to the Georgia Development Regulations in cooperation with the Planning Commission. The changes will be considered for adoption in 2021.
- Consulted with local officials, identified projects and provided technical assistance for Municipal Roads Grants-in-Aid construction projects.
- Provided planning and zoning technical assistance.
- Completed an update of the locally adopted Hazard Mitigation Plan which identifies measures the Town can take to reduce risks from future disasters.
- Provided administrative support for the Northwest Communications Union District; Georgia is a member.
- Consulted with local officials and evaluated infrastructure projects that address water quality concerns and should be pursued for implementation.
- COVID-19: Provided technical assistance for the Town with the Local Government Expense Reimbursement Program as well as Continuity of Operations planning.
- Provided funds to purchase coolers & equipment for the Georgia Food Shelf through a US Economic Development Association grant.

This year the Commission will assist our member municipalities with response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Municipal Roads General Permit compliance, water quality project implementation, local energy planning, emergency preparedness, brownfields redevelopment and other needed services. NRPC will implement improvements to the Missisquoi Valley Rail Trail and increase marketing efforts, support local farm and food businesses through its Healthy Roots Collaborative and assist the new Northwest Communications Union District in expanding broadband access in the region. The Commission has no regulatory or taxing authority; however, each year we do request a per capita assessment in support of local and regional activities and to provide matching funds for state and federal programs.

Your continued support for local and regional planning is greatly appreciated. NRPC is your resource - please call on us for assistance with planning, zoning, transportation, mapping or other needs.

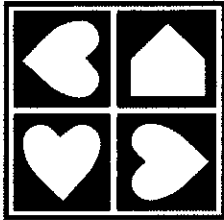

### **FY 2020**

### **What is Franklin County Home Health Agency?**

Franklin County Home Health Agency is a 501(c) 3 non-profit corporation that has proudly provided residents Franklin County with high quality, comprehensive home health, hospice, long term care and wellness services since 1969.

### **What is the Agency's Mission and Purpose?**

We provide high quality health care services in home and community settings. We are committed to excellence. We meet the needs of our clients in a professional manner that promotes health, independence, comfort, dignity and quality of life.

### **What is the Agency's service area?**

The Agency serves all 15 towns in Franklin County through our two offices – one in St. Albans and one in Enosburg Falls. We serve people of all ages.

### **How many patients did the Agency serve in 2020?**

The Agency made a total of 65,621 visits to 2,087 Franklin County residents.

We made the following number of visits to the residents Franklin County:

39,020	Home Care Services
22,088	Long Term Care Services
4,513	Hospice Services

### **How many people does the Agency employ?**

The Agency currently has a staff of 140 Registered Nurses, Licensed Practical Nurses, Physical Therapists, Occupational Therapists, Speech-Language Pathologists, Medical Social Workers, Licensed Nursing Assistants, Care Attendants, Homemakers, and Office Support Staff.

### **What are the Agency's Programs and Services?**

Home Care: We provide medically necessary home health services to people of all ages. Examples include individuals who need wound care, a person newly diagnosed with diabetes needing insulin administration and instruction, or a mother and newborn newly discharged from the hospital.

Home Telemonitoring Program: We use state of the art technology to remotely monitor our patients' weight, blood pressure, heart rate and oxygen status to help improve their health condition and avoid hospitalization.

Hospice: We care for people with serious illness for whom the prognosis is less than six months of life. The focus of this care is on achieving comfort and quality of life.

Palliative Care: This program balances advanced medical technology with the wishes of each individual client by focusing on psychological, physical, social and spiritual needs by providing a strong support system to help the client and family cope during the serious illness. This program understands that maintaining quality of life is an important aspect of care.

Long Term Care: We help disabled and older members of our community with personal care, housekeeping, meal preparation, errands and shopping to allow them to stay independent in their own home.

Maternal Child Health Program and Childbirth Education Program: We help to prepare pregnant women for a healthy pregnancy, labor and delivery, breastfeeding and new infant care.

In addition, we offer infusion therapy, foot clinics, grief and bereavement services and wellness services to our community. Majority of additional services were postponed due to COVID-19.

### **How are services paid for?**

As a Medicare certified Agency, we receive reimbursement from Medicare, Medicaid, and other third-party insurances. In 2020 we received 72 percent of our revenue from Medicare and Medicaid.

We are committed to providing medically necessary home care services to all those in need regardless of their ability to pay. Without individual town appropriations and donor gifts, our ability to provide care could be adversely impacted.

### **Why does the Agency need money from towns?**

The Agency depends on the money received from towns to subsidize the cost of care provided to patients who are uninsured or underinsured. Last year the Agency provided more than \$558,186 in free and subsidized care, this was a significant increase due to the pandemic.

### COVID-19

2020 has been a challenging year for Vermonters. However, the Vermont Department of Health has been recognized as a national leader in managing the virus. This is what the Health Department has done in your community:

- COVID-19 Testing:
  - Since May 2020, the Health Department has provided no-cost Covid-19 testing. Through November 17, 2020, the Vermont Department of Health has held 509 testing clinics, testing 40,796 Vermonters. This important work helps to identify the spread of Covid-19 and is just one of the many ways your Health Department is promoting and protecting the health of Vermonters.
  - Statewide, 224,284 people have been tested as of November 30, 2020
- COVID-19 Cases:
  - As of November 25, 2020, Vermont had the fewest cases of COVID-19 and the lowest rate of cases per 100,000 population of all 50 states.
  - Statewide, as of November 30, 2020, there have been 4,172 cases of COVID-19

### Additional Programs

In addition to the COVID-19 response, the Health Department has programs such as influenza vaccinations and WIC.

- Flu Vaccinations: Protecting people from influenza is particularly important in 2020, as the flu may complicate recovery from COVID-19. (Data is as of November 17, 2020)
  - Approximately 213,00\* Vermonters have been vaccinated against the flu this season \*(Due to technology outages, flu vaccinations given are underreported by approximately 25%-33%.)
- WIC: The Women, Infants, and Children Nutrition Education and Food Supplementation Program remains in full effect, though much of the work that was done in person is now being done remotely through TeleWIC. (Data is as of October 20, 2020)
  - 11,308 infants, children, and pregnant, postpartum, and breastfeeding people were served by WIC in Vermont, either in traditional format or TeleWIC

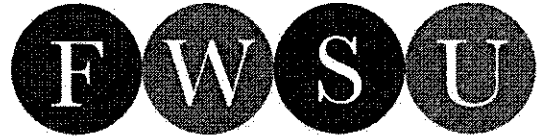

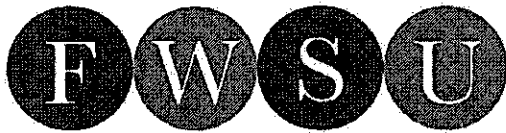

Dear Georgia Community Members,

As we approach Town Meeting Day, I want to thank you for your continued support of Georgia Elementary and Middle School (GEMS) as a student, parent, family member, or community member. I believe that your commitment to our schools has been fantastic. Our schools in Franklin West Supervisory Union mirror our close knit communities. Each day I see hard work, creativity, and teamwork reflected on the faces of our students. I also see professional dedicated teachers and staff working diligently to make our schools continually improve even during a pandemic. I see educational environments that are inspiring, stimulating, and innovative.

Beginning in September mask wearing, social distancing, sanitizing, and cleaning became the new norm for the 2020-2021 school years. The students at GEMS began the year in the Hybrid Instructional Model allowing us to keep "pods" of students together, reducing possible exposure, and the reduction of class sizes, which resulted in more personalized instruction and the formation of lasting relationships within the classroom setting. In November we brought GEMS students grades K-4 back to school four days a week for In-Person Learning, which allowed students to renew friendships with all of their grade level classmates. Beginning in January 2021 students in grades 5-6 returned for four days of In-Person instruction as well. The flexibility that our faculty and staff have exhibited this year has been quite remarkable and is a testament toward the GEMS established tradition of serving others. Students have benefited greatly this year from increased outdoor learning opportunities, and a thoughtful "Big 4 Focus."

The academic "Big 4 Focus" includes Literacy Proficiency Focusing on Writing as Effective Communication for All Learners, Math Proficiency Focusing on High Expectations for All Learners, Comprehensive Early Warning Systems for All Learners, and Equity for All. Teachers are receiving professional learning in the area of writing and the student writing experiences at GEMS are rich with an abundance of creativity. The principals, faculty, and staff at GEMS utilize a laser-like, pragmatic approach to teach writing. This approach is creating and growing students who think creatively to express their thoughts with meaningful words to act as productive citizens. In mathematics, teachers are working collaboratively to emphasize and grow critical thinking skills at all grade levels. Focusing on Early Warning Systems as we improve learning through our goals in literacy and math enabled us to focus on the needs of individual learners, as smaller class sizes were offered for students in the initial hybrid model, allowing for a net result of personalizing educational goals and objectives for all students to ensure their continuing progress. In the area of equity, there is an emphasis toward providing sustainable, quality learning experiences for all students. An example of this is the distribution of "hotspots" to assist with technology connections to support families struggling with reliable remote access.

Georgia Elementary and Middle School is a jewel within the community and a source of pride for Franklin West Supervisory Union. The flexibility, caring attitude, and creativity demonstrated by students, families, teachers, staff members, the School Board, and the community have created many bright spots during a challenging time in the history of education. With more than half of the students in the United States learning remotely this year, I am grateful that our students are learning in-person. A few of the positives that have occurred this year include: the positive relationships that are being forged with the flexible pivoting that is occurring with In-Person learning; the Hybrid Model, and Remote learning; the enhanced communication that is occurring with the convenience of virtual meetings for students and parents; and the In-Person opportunities for students to experience the arts, music programs elective courses, physical education, and athletics. It is important to highlight that GEMS has a robust arts program from which Dorsey Hogg was recognized as the Vermont Art Educators Association (VAEA) Vermont Art Teacher of the Year.

In closing, our essential focus on teaching and learning allows us to deliver an education that is rigorous and relevant in the real world and reflects the knowledge and skills our students need to graduate with success. I am honored to serve the towns of Franklin West Supervisory Union in partnership with you to ensure every student's continued growth and success.
