IMPORTANT INFORMATION 2020:

Dog Licensing: Licensing will take place at the Town Office starting January 1, 2020. They will be considered delinquent after April 1* and a late fee will be assessed. The fees are as follows: \$10 for spayed/neutered, \$17 for non-spayed/non-neutered.

Property Taxes: Payment is due on October 15, 2020. After this date, there is a collection fee of 8% applied to the tax bill and interest charged at 1.5% for every month thereafter.

Green Mountain Passport: Georgia residents over 62 may get an application for a Green Mountain Passport at the Town Clerk's Office.

SELECTBOARD HIGHLIGHTS - 2019

Town Meeting

- Steve Lamos and Deb Woodward were elected to 1-year terms on the Selectboard. Jason Burt was
 elected to a 3-year term.
- The residents of Georgia approved a Town operating and capital budget of \$2,907,660 that translated into a Town tax rate of \$0.2970/per hundred.
- The voters approved the purchase of 5.4 acres from Olive and Gary Gilmond behind the current town garage on Plains Road for future uses. This transaction occurred on December 18, 2019. We are looking at this land as a future site of potential town buildings, including a new garage.

Town Highways

The Highway Department did another excellent job of maintaining our roads, culverts and ditches throughout the year. Paving was not able to be accomplished in 2019 due to the fact that our vendor, Pike Industries, was unable to fulfill their contract. This means that the 2019 and 2020 paving will be completed at the same time.

- The Highway Department crew includes Road Commissioner & Foreman Todd Cadieux, Assistant Road Foreman Robert Quesnel, Driver/Laborer Will Jones, and per diem drivers, Marc Jones and Eric Couture.
- A new roof was installed at the Town Garage as well as updating of wiring and upgrading of the heating system and vehicle exhaust systems. This should help as the town transitions to a new garage.

Town Offices

Our elected officials and employees have had another busy and productive year. The Selectboard wishes to thank everyone involved for their resilience, hard work and tremendous public service.

- The Town welcomed Assistant Town Clerk Dawn Penny and Selectboard Clerk Samuel Gould to the staff.
- Town Administrator Michael McCarthy departed in July and we welcomed Amber Baker as our new Town Administrator in September.
- Elected officials and employees continue to assist with Meals on Wheels deliveries in the Georgia community every Wednesday morning.
- Administration Impact Fees and budgeted monies were used to improve wiring at the Town Offices
 and updated security of the computer server. New windows were also installed.
- The library had heating improvements, ceiling tile replacements and a new electrical box installed in 2019
- Cindy Deyak is our Zoning Administrator and the Town welcomed Larry Lewack as Planning Coordinator in August.
- Gatherings on the Green were a huge success in 2019. This was a great effort made by several
 people to bring the community together for good food, great music and togetherness. There will be
 6 events on the green in 2020.
- Approximately \$31,307 was collected in Town Impact Fees. These funds will be used to offset capital expenditures, as defined by the Capital Budget.

- Adoption of the 2019-2024 Capital Budget was successfully completed. Please see our website for a complete version of this approved plan.
- The Town is currently updating the Georgia Development Regulations and looks forward to implementing a Development Review Board (DRB) in summer of 2020.

Items of Note

- Longtime Selectboard member and Road Commissioner, Ric Nye retired in March. The Town is grateful for his many, many years of service to the Town of Georgia.
- Long time Administrative Assistant Krissy Jenkins departed in May. The Town wishes her luck on her new adventure and thanks her for almost 15 years of service.
- Through disciplined prudent budget building and management, the Town of Georgia continues to enjoy a lower municipal tax rate than many surrounding towns. The proposed 2020 operating budget is \$3,488,558 of which \$1,934,935 is to be raised by taxes. This is a budget increase of 5.3 percent from 2019. The overall tax rate increase will be approximately 1 cent. The 2020 budget includes the addition of one additional person to the Highway Department, increases to reserve funds for future purchases to support the approved Capital Budget, the purchase of a new highway truck and the purchase of a used ladder truck. Also, the budget, if approved, will allow Georgia residents to enjoy residential pricing through programs of the St. Albans Recreation Department.

The Town is actively represented on the Northwest Regional Planning Commission Board of Commissioners, the NRPC Transportation Advisory Committee, the Georgia Industrial Development Corporation Board of Directors and the Northwest Solid Waste District. The Selectboard and the Town Administrator would like to recognize and thank all Town employees and elected officials for the gifts of their talent and their professionalism and express their deep appreciation to all the volunteers who work so unselfishly in endeavors for Georgia.

Municipal government depends on the cooperative volunteer efforts of community members. The Town of Georgia is always looking for qualified individuals to serve as town officers, or as members of the commissions and boards. There are also special committees which may be chartered by the Selectboard. You can review the complete list of Town Officers in this Town Report. Georgia Conservation Commission 2019 Report

We had a new member join the Georgia Conservation Commission this year. Chris Bouchard joined our board. You may know him as one of the former Eye on the Sky meteorologists on VPR.

Since the purchase of the Silver Lake woods property, we had been operating on a temporary management plan, and early this year we completed and adapted a permanent management plan. VELCO has a right of way through this property, and they completed herbicide treatment (on a 4-year cycle) to keep the power lines cleared. They also downed a few trees along the edges of the powerline. VELCO also installed a nice gate at the property entrance. Part of the management plan is that no motorized vehicles are allowed on the property, except during emergencies. There was an emergency rescue on the property during bow hunting season. Our Silver Lake Woods provided a bit of revenue to the town, as Gilles Rainville installed about 200 taps in the maple grove on the east side of the property, and we collected a small fee per tap. In mid-October, a small VYCC crew worked on building a connector trail from the western trail across to the eastern trail. We hope to do trail markings in the next year. During the Halloween storm, the large culvert on the class 4 portion of Silver Lake Road became blocked and caused flooding along the class 4 road on the property. Chris and Rob got the culvert cleared and worked on shoring up a waterbar further up the hill to help manage runoff on the road. We have been studying ways to improve the road and water crossing. Suzanna did a lot of research on the history of the Silver Lake Woods property and we hope to have a Wayside sign installed with that information. next summer.

In May, the Friends of Northern Lake Champlain, Northwest Regional Planning Commission and Stone Environmental submitted the final report on a DEC ERP grant to help further identify, design, and eventually implement, stormwater treatment best management practices along Route 7 and 104a to address flows to the Deer Brook gully from impervious surfaces, as well as upland areas, and identify and design remediation alternatives to stabilize the gully channel. The upland restoration designs include four gravel wetlands, two catch basin risers, and a deep sump catch basin, with the goal of reducing stormwater runoff volume and peak flows conveyed to the gully head. The in-channel restoration designs include a drop manhole system that shifts stormwater discharges from the top of the gully to the base of the gully slope, in addition to eight in-channel step-pool structures that will incorporate downed trees and bioengineering practices, resulting in reduced flow velocities and restabilization of gully banks. Next steps, involving GCC will be to pursue and file grant applications for project implementations and continuing to coordinate with private landowners and VTrans regarding the potential implementation for each project.

Jeremy Little, son of Karyn and Kevin Goebel and Glenn Little is the 2019 Conservation Commission Scholarship winner. The scholarship is awarded to a member of the graduating high school class who is planning to a thend a post-secondary school and major in a field or related field of conservation, environmental studies, or ecology, and is a resident of the Town of Georgia. Jeremy has a long list of school and community activities that demonstrated his commitment to improving the environment and conservation.

On May 31, GCC transported a new Timberhomes Kiosk which was installed at the head of the Deer Brook trail. In the coming year, a new trail map is being designed, and we hope to provide ANR updates, as well as trail guidelines on the kiosk. Suzanna did some cutting of trees and branches to keep the trails open. There was a mass failure of a retention pond on a neighboring property that caused a big wash of water and debris to flow down through the RGNA property. Fortunately, no damage occurred to the trails.

On Saturday, May 4th, the statewide annual Green Up Day event was held once again with impressive results for Georgia, VT! Volunteers from our community spent hours during the days leading up to the event, or on the day of the event itself, walking town roads and picking up garbage. A special shout-out to our town road crew, as this event produces quite a bit of work for them. Some local companies like Liquid Measurement Systems and Med Associates stepped up to the challenge and volunteered their time to help the effort. Our town final count was 147 bags of trash, in addition to a myriad of old mattresses, tires, electronics, bikes, pipes and broken furniture! This was all found discarded on our roadsides, and in our town public parcels. The continued need for this annual event remains clear, as does the need for volunteers to make it successful! Please report illegal dumping to the Northwest Solid Waste District at any time of the year. Thanks again to all who were able to get out for this event, for the hard work that goes into making it happen, and for your continuing pride in making Georgia a bit more beautiful. It takes a village!

The Georgia Conservation Commission provided input to the Selectboard and Planning Commission regarding the installation of a solar farm in a class 3 wetland. We also brought the pending Emerald Ash Borer crisis to the attention to the Selectboard. I'm sure you will be hearing more about this in the coming year.

Have you visited the Henley Webster town forest? Have you ever hiked to Silver Lake? Did you know two of the town-owned properties have picnic tables? During 2020, get out and enjoy some of the many areas of natural beauty in Georgia. Zoning Administrator's Report 2019

The Georgia zoning office continues to be active issuing permits, assisting applicants, facilitating records research, providing information to the public, investigating potential zoning violations, and assisting the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

A total of 75 building permits were issued this year, a decrease from 87 in 2018. New dwelling units decreased from 16 in 2018 to 15 in 2019 and consisted of 11 new single family residences, one triplex, and one accessory apartment. Five of the single family dwelling units were specifically for elderly housing. One commercial sign permit and one home occupation permit were also approved. The remaining building permits were issued for accessory structures including garages, sheds, decks, porches, pools, fences, and residential additions. In addition, two boundary line adjustments and three seasonal conversions were administratively approved.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment conducted three public hearings granting a conditional use permit for a triplex for elderly housing, and an amendment to a previously approved conditional use permit for an outdoor events facility. In addition, the Zoning Board of Adjustment denied a request for a height variance in the Lakeshore District.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment meets on the first and third Mondays of each month on an as-needed basis to hold public hearings for conditional uses, variances, and zoning appeals. There is currently one vacancy on the board. If you are interested in serving your community on the Zoning Board of Adjustment, please contact the Zoning Administrator for further information.

2019 Planning Commission Highlights

The Georgia Planning Commission held a total of 29 public hearings on proposed projects in town in 2019, up from 25 hearings in 2018. Income from planning fees decreased from \$6,937 in 2018 to \$6,072 in 2019. The Planning Commission completed 6 sketch plan reviews, 10 subdivision preliminary or final plat reviews, 1 site plan amendment, and 1 boundary line adjustment during 2019. A total of 44 new building lots were reviewed this year, of which 25 earned final approval.

During 2019, two members of the Planning Commission resigned: Steve Rabideau and Maurice Fitzgerald. The town would like to thank both Steve and Maurice for their service. Two new members joined this year: Greg Drew, and David Vincent. Former Planning Coordinator Ryan Bell left in early summer to accept a new position. Lary Martel ably filled in as an interim coordinator until Larry Lewack was hired in August.

With help from staff at the Northwest Regional Planning Commission, your Planning Commission continued its efforts to update the Georgia Development Regulations in 2019. We plan to complete this current round of bylaw amendments in 2020. In addition to ongoing quality improvements, we will streamline our permitting process by creating a single Development Review Board to conduct all required public hearings and make decisions on all conditional uses, variances, changes of use, site plan reviews, and subdivision applications. This change will eliminate the Zoning Board of Adjustment and shift the Planning Commission's role to focus only on policy (i.e. updating the development regulations and town plan). The Selectboard will appoint members of the new Development Review Board, if this change is approved. Both the Planning Commission and the Selectboard will hold publicly warned hearings for community input, once a final draft of these regulation changes is complete.

If you are planning a building project for your property or need to subdivide land for a future building project, it's best to get started early! Call or visit the Planning and Zoning Department staff to learn about what will be required for applications and fees for your project. If your plan requires a new driveway access into a state road, drilled wells, impacts on a wetland or needs a new septic system, state permits will also be required. With our requirement to publicly warn and hold (sometimes multiple) public hearings, it can take several weeks, or months, to obtain final approval for your project. Advance notice of these hearings are sent to project neighbors, published in the St. Albans Messenger, and posted at the town office, the Georgia Market and our Public Library. The town website, at www.townofgeorgia.com also displays Planning Commission meeting agendas & minutes, planning and zoning application forms and other info, including the town's Development Regulations. In 2020, we will start posting the PC's decisions online, to make the results of our work more accessible to the public.

The Planning Commission meets on an as-needed basis at 7:00 pm on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month. Most meetings are video-recorded by LCATV for later broadcast; they are also archived online, see: https://lcatv.org/georgia. Planning Dept. office hours are Tuesdays from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm, and by appointment. Any questions or comments may be directed to the Planning Coordinator, at 524-3524 x207.

As always, we welcome and appreciate public input in our hearings and meetings and look forward to serving the citizens of Georgia in 2020.

2019 Assessor Report

The Assessor's office is responsible for maintaining the Grand List. The Grand List is utilized to set municipal and education tax rates.

The 2019 Real Estate Market has seen favorable conditions which has led to modest increases in market values. Based upon the State of Vermont Division of Property Valuation and Review, market values increased one and a half percent in the last year. The Common Level of Assessment which measures the average sale price compared to assessed value was placed at 93.99 percent which means most properties in town are selling roughly six percent higher than what assessments are. More importantly, the measure of equitable assessments remains stable and below 10 percent, meaning most properties in town are assessed in a comparable fashion to other similar valued properties.

The Assessor has informed the Selectboard regarding a reappraisal in the future. At this time there is no statutory requirement for a reappraisal, however the last reappraisal was conducted in 2006 and the Division of Property Valuation and Review recommends a reappraisal be completed once every ten years. Due to the accuracy of the Grand List regarding equitable assessments the need for a reappraisal is not yet necessary. It is anticipated that a reappraisal will be completed in 2023 -2025.

The current municipal Grand List is \$638,000,017 which is an increase of \$5,934,557 over the previous year, representing just under a one percent increase.

The town of Georgia has voted to extend the Veterans Exemption from the state allocation of \$10,000 to \$40,000. Currently there are 35 Veterans who are eligible for an exemption. If you are a Veteran or spouse of a Veteran please contact the Assessors' office for information on eligibility.

The Assessor has regular office hours on Thursdays from 10 am to 12 pm. Office staff is available during regular municipal hours to assist property owners and answer most questions. The assessor is available via email through the Town of Georgia website.

The Georgia Fire Department responded to 165 calls in 2019, up fourteen calls or 8.5% from the previous year. The firefighters logged over 3,300 hours responding to calls, training, and maintaining the equipment and the fire station. These do not include the hundreds of other hours volunteered by the firefighters attending other meetings, out of area trainings, conducting fire prevention activities, events, and other duties. I would like to thank all members for their continued dedication and service to the Fire Department. I would also like to thank their families for their continued support.

In February of this past year, we took delivery of our new Rescue Engine. This truck was a capital replacement of our 1994 Engine. The new truck is a multi-use truck. The rescue engine has the capabilities of a fire engine for firefighting purposes and also has the capabilities of a rescue truck for vehicle extrications. The truck was dedicated to Steven Lapierre at our annual Calcutta with his family present. Steven Lapierre was a long-time member, Fire Warden, and Past Assistant Chief, who Died In The Line Of Duty in 2016.

The construction of our Memorial to honor our Responders began in the summer of 2018. This Memorial is to honor ALL of our Georgia Fire and First Responders, past, present and future who carry on the noble tradition of unselfish service to the Georgia Community and its visitors. This past September the delivery of the much anticipated, engraved granite memorial center piece occurred and was placed. Continuation of the monument needed to wait until this was put in place. The final stages of the memorial should be completed this summer. The Memorial was funded entirely by donations and fund raising by Georgia Fire and Rescue Association members. I am happy to report that the cost of the memorial has been raised in its entirety. I would like to thank those who donated or attended fundraisers for their generous support. Thank you for helping us honor your First Responders.

The fire department gained four new members in 2019. The new members are Quinton Banus, Paul Carpenter, Will Jones, and Landon Baker. We welcome them to the department and thank them in advance for their service. 2019 Georgia First Response

To the Residents of the Town of Georgia,

Georgia First response is a Vermont Licensed First Response agency through the Department of Health and EMS office, that currently provides Advanced Level care to the residents of the Town of Georgia. Georgia First Responses membership is made up of 12 certified members ranging from EMT to AEMT and are fully equipped to handle all types of medical related incidents.

In 2019 we were dispatched to a total of 262 incidents, varying from lift assists and motor vehicle accidents with minor injuries to the more severe incidents such as cardiac arrests. Our providers continue to provide the best care possible to our community. We continue to work and train closely with Amcare Ambulance, ensuring that we are providing the best care to our community.

In doing so we are staying current with changing trends in EMS care and how it is provided to the communities of Vermont. Over the past year we have focused our training on the new technique of providing CPR. This technique is called **High Performance CPR** and has shown to greatly increase survivability in cardiac arrests nationwide. We hope to continue with this training and incorporate the Georgia Fire Department, so that they are fully trained on this new technique as well. Even further increasing our chances of saving someone's life.

As always, we continue to offer the Art Carroll EMS Scholarship to those individuals interested in taking an EMS course and potentially starting their careers in the EMS field. This scholarship is funded by the Georgia Fire and Rescue Association through funds raised during community events such as the annual Calcutta and Soccer Jamboree. We encourage anyone who is interested in taking an EMS course to reach out to Andrew Dunsmore, EMS Chief of Georgia First Response to receive more information about applying for this scholarship.

Georgia Public Library Annual Report 2019

It was a year of growth at the Georgia Public Library! This year necessary repairs were made to the electrical panel, and the heating on the east side of the building. We now have hot water in the Community Room. Progress towards an ADA Renovation continues. We are leasing a new printer/scanner. We implemented a new consortium-based library management system, KOHA. Partnering with 19 other libraries statewide, Georgia taxpayers can now readily access these library's holdings and have them delivered to GPL. Since introducing KOHA in June, interlibrary loans have increased 12.5%

As a hub of the Georgia community, we treasure our long-standing connections with the Georgia Food Shelf and the Georgia Historical Society. As we look to the future, we strive to hear, anticipate and meet the evolving needs of our community. Every Wednesday at 9 an informal group gathers to chat and work on a puzzle. We have partnered with the Parent Child Center of NCSS to provide a space for their Playgroup Tuesdays at 9:00 am. As more and more residents who work from home are discovering, GPL is a great place to connect not only to Wi-Fi but with business partners. We offer a place to spread out work papers, and make use of our high quality print/scan capabilities, all without the distractions of working at home.

Our programming is diverse and well attended, with traditional offerings in 2019 like book group, writers club, and fiber arts. New in 2019, we offered patrons info sessions on using our new library management system, KOHA. We also welcomed Brynne the therapy dog, reading buddy for kids on Monday afternoon. VT Author Sue Halpern visited us to share conversation on her latest works. Community groups are welcome to use our meeting space. In 2019 diverse groups, such as AARP tax preparers, Let's Grow VT Kids, Lake Champlain Access TV, water district, PTO, NAMI, scouts and soccer, to name but a few reserved the meeting room. Let us know if your community group needs meeting space!

Children's and youth programming, and outreach to early education providers in the community continue to be an essential part of the GPL mission. Programming during the school year and through the 2019 Summer Reading Program "A Universe of Stories" included a dramatic presentation by Backpack Theater, 5 movie showings with popcorn, special activities on the Mars Rover, lunar phases, gravity and movement on different planets, clocks using the big dipper, pinwheel crafts of the galaxy, "Wildlife Tails" with the Southern VT Natural History Museum—who brought several birds of prey, a tarantula, a few indigenous snakes and a bunny. We had a dance contest! We made straw rockets and balloon rockets, we even offered a special "glow in the dark" storytime. We offered a teen special effects makeup workshop for Halloween, and we made Harry Potter wands.

291 children registered to be "summer reading stars". They reported reading over a thousand books last summer! Story time is thriving. Join us Friday mornings at 10am. Brick Builders Club, led by Ben Ebert meets weekly at 3:30 on Fridays. Weekly deliveries of library materials were made to five Georgia early education providers for the 23rd year. The Library hosted a Giving Tree for children in Georgia again this vear. The number of children who received gifts was 17. Thank von for making this program successful.

We are tremendously thankful to our trustees, volunteers, and friends for their tireless support of the library! We welcome Jessica Fike as our new Friends coordinator.

Georgia Historical Society Names David Juaire Volunteer of the Year

The Georgia Historical Society, founded in 1975 to preserve and promote knowledge about the people, places, stories and artifacts that comprise the unique history of our town, annually recognizes a standout member of the community with the Volunteer of the Year award. The 2020 award goes to David Juaire, a lifelong resident and self-taught photographer whose many contributions include documenting the lives and landscapes of our community.

David was born and raised on the dairy farm he still calls home. He attended first through fourth grades at the Stone School on Polly Hubbard Road toward the end of the one-room schoolhouse era, from 1952-56. Early on, he developed an appreciation for the beauty of the pastoral scenes surrounding him and he determined to learn how to capture them in photos. For over three decades, his stunning images graced the pages of Vermont Life magazine.

The Georgia Historical Society has been enriched over many years by David's talents as "the man behind the camera." He has tirelessly documented Georgia's important events through photos and was a key collaborator on "Dairy Barns of Georgia" and other publications the organization produced. His leadership as past president and continued service as a director have been invaluable, as have the many hours of manual labor he has contributed to maintain Gordons Mill and other historical sites in town.

As the 2020 Volunteer of the Year, David has earned the designation as one of Georgia's most essential and memorable citizens.

Mission Statement

The mission of the Vermont State Police is to individually and collectively serve and protect by providing the highest quality of professional law enforcement services. The mission of the Troopers assigned to the St Albans Barracks is to protect the citizens of Franklin and Grand Isle Counties. We also plan to work with local law enforcement to establish viable Intelligence Based Policing (IBP) teams. By unity of effort and criminal intelligence gathering, we will detect, disrupt, degrade and dismandte criminal activity. It is the goal of the St Albans Barracks to achieve this with, and through interagency, community, and private enterprise cooperation. By working together, we can educate, empower and foster trust while simultaneously identifying criminal networks within our communities. We will strive to reduce crime and enforce the laws of our roadways through criminal investigations, as well as, aggressive highway safety enforcement.

Specialty Services Provided by Troopers assigned to the St Albans Barracks

In addition to their field primary responsibilities, many of the troopers assigned to the St Albans Barracks are members of special response teams that provide expert response capabilities in a variety of areas to address critical needs throughout Vermont.

The breakdown of these responses is as follows:

1 Trooper - Drug Recognition Expert (DRE)

3 Troopers - on the Tactical Services Unit (TSU)

1 Trooper - on the Crime Scene Search Team (CSST)

Annual Report from Franklin County Industrial Development Corporation

For Calendar Year 2019

The mission of Franklin County Industrial Development Corporation (FCIDC) is to engage in a process of building a strong and diversified market economy that serves the Interest of area enterprises municipalities, residents and to strengthen our economy through the creation and retention of jobs and build a business environment suitable to host capital investment. Our budget is compiled of multiple sources of funding of which 40% comes from the State of Vermont and Franklin County towns. The total size of the FCIDC operating budget is \$255,000. FCIDC has been around for 48 years and the funding request of our local communities has not changed over the last 25 years.

The local economy is currently very strong with almost full employment, the current unemployment rate for the County is 2.5%; not bad when you consider it was 12% fifty years ago. Franklin County is only one of three Vermont counties out of 14 experiencing a growth in population; we must be doing something right. In Vermont as a whole, the death rate is outpacing the birth rate. Our county is fortunate enough to have great job diversity i.e. manufacturing, government, healthcare, service industries, education and agriculture. Milk prices are slowly rising after three years of continued low prices. We are also seeing a growth in the tourism sector. In a nut shell there are hundreds and hundreds of rural counties across our country that would trade places with Franklin County in a heartbeat. Sure, we have our problems, but we have great organizations throughout our county that are working on addressing many of our issues.

FCIDC definitely does not take all of the credit for the economic success that our County is experiencing. We are thankful for all of the Trustees and Selectboard members who understand the need for quality jobs, whether it is in Swanton, St. Albans or Enosburg we as a county stand to benefit from those Jobs. Organizations like the Swanton Enhancement Project, the Enosburg Initiative, Richford Economic Advancement Corporation, Georgia Industrial Development Corporation and the Montgomery VCRD Community Visit Team are all volunteer driven Initiatives that are doing outstanding projects to improve the quality of life for those communities. FCIDC has been engaged with all of these organizations in one form or another.

FCIDC is currently assisting in a feasibility study led by the Town of Highgate to bring water and possibly sewer from Swanton to the Highgate Airport. Highgate received a grant to do the work from Vermont's Community Development Block Grant of which FCIDC contributed \$1,000 to the match. The FCIDC Board recently committed \$15,000 to the Brigham Academy project in Bakersfield, an effort to convert the old school to senior housing. We also worked closely with the City of \$1. Albans to keep the Geneseo and Wyoming Rail Dispatch Center from leaving the county. A new facility will be built on City land, FCIDC will be investing \$25,000 in the project to offset design and permitting costs. This initiative will keep 65 well paying jobs in the county. In addition to all of the above we are optimistic that we could close on three lots in the \$1. Albans Town Industrial Park and potentially break ground in 2020. Franklin County has much to be thankful for and looking ahead we should be optimistic for a continued strong economy in 2020.



Annual Report 2020

The Friends of Northern Lake Champlain (FNLC) is a non-profit organization that acts to clean the waters of northern Lake Champlain and its watershed by working collaboratively with citizens, businesses, farmers and government to reduce land-use pollution.

Our focus is to increase implementation and to encourage local, state, and federal funding necessary to obtain real results. There can be no improvement in Lake Champlain water quality without the on-the-ground projects that improve the waters flowing into the Lake. FNLC has also continued work on all implementation projects detailed below.

Lake Lessons

Each September, FNLC, partner watershed organizations, government water and soil quality groups, and the Saint Albans Museum presented shoreside STEAM educational outreach to local school students in grades four and eight. Lake Lessons educates nearly 600 students from St. Albans Town and City, Swanton, and Georgia fourth and eighth graders, plus faculty, and parents.



Deer Brook Gully Remediation

As part of the State's Clean Water Initiative Program's competitive grant process, FNLC completed Phase 1 to study and design eight gravel swale improvement projects for the Deer Brook Gully Restoration along Route 7 in

Georgia, VT. Over the next few years, FNLC will collaborate with VTrans and private landowners to complete the eight gravel swale projects.

This will serve to develop a solution to a large sediment contributor to the Deer Brook that both protects the State's water quality and supports FNLC's goal to correct the highest priority project determined in the 2013 Stormwater Report for the Town of Georgia.

Working with Agricultural Partners

FNLC maintains its long working relationship and respect for Vermont farms. As small farms are assigned water quality improvement projects by Vermont Agency of Agriculture Food and Marketing (VAAFM) inspectors, FNLC has completed its four-year North Lake Priority Farms contract to help small farms through the financial procurement on these farm improvements. The most recent example was completion of a stormwater project on a middle-sized dairy farm in Swanton. For a decade, FNLC has been collecting water samples on the Rock River in Highgate and aided in developing one of the most comprehensive datasets for an isolated watershed.

Each February and August, FNLC hosts the Winter and Summer Farm Meetings with UVM Extension, and the Farmer's Watershed Alliance to bring new field techniques and technologies information to local farms. This meeting is a prime opportunity for farmers and landowners to see first-hand the best management practices (BMPs) by good conservation farms in the water basin.

Two-tiered Ditch Project

The Bouchard Ditch in Highgate/Franklin is a two-tiered ditch created to prevent flooding in a field on the Bouchard Farm by mimicking a natural floodplain. During high flow events, the water flow was restricted to the ditch area and slowed to improve absorption in the designated area. Monitoring of this project began in 2019 and will continue for the next five years to collect valuable data to share with Vermont farmers. By monitoring this pilot project, we may know how many pollutants this ditch is keeping out of Lake Champlain.

Rain Gardens & Rain Barrels (Green Stormwater Infrastructure)

In 2019, FNLC applied for and won a grant to design and install either rain gardens at three area schools, including Georgia Elementary & Middle School, BFA Fairfax, and Alburgh Elementary School. These projects tie together BMPs and STEM education for educators and students, as well as education and outreach to the community. Each education center project in in progress with completion expected by summer 2020.



Working with Community Partners

Through our cooperative grant with NRPC and St. Albans City and Town planners, the FNLC ECO Americorps member led volunteer community clean up events. These clean up events include Green Up Day and April Stools Day. Currently, this member is working on a project to install rain gardens or maintain rain gardens within city limits.

Educational Fundraisers and Athletic Events

Thanks to the public for participating in FNLC's athletic and education fundraising events. We combine meeting with statewide lake leaders, legislators, state and federal agency leaders, and FNLC members in community oriented social settings of the Bike for the Lake, Run for the Lake, and the Tyler Place Dinner & Fundraiser.





Northwest Vermont Solid Waste Management District 2019 Supervisors' Report

The Northwest Solid Waste District's (NWSWD) mission is to provide for the efficient, economical, and environmentally-sound reduction, reuse, recycling, and finally disposal of solid waste. 2019 was a great year for waste reduction and recycling in the NWSWD - our efforts resulted in the District successfully diverting more waste from the landfill than any year before! Waste diverted was recycled or reused and helped conserve resources and keep toxic materials out of Vermont landfills.

The District increased our programs and services like composting, hazardous waste disposal, and reuse. We also offered more workshops and increased our ability to pass on useful information through channels like farmers' markets, fairs, and the internet. These efforts helped Franklin and Grand Isle Counties reduce the waste they sent to the landfill. We measure our success by looking at the weight of waste that we sent to the landfill and what we were able to divert through reuse and recycling. All of this work shows in the amount of waste we diverted from the landfill this year. Some of this year's highlights include:

- District communities collectively diverted 31% of their waste from the landfill.
- District operations diverted 1,860 tons of waste from the landfill in 2019! This is an over 7% increase from 2018!!
- NWSWD facilities recycled over 97 tons of e-waste.
- Staff held seven "Backvard Composting" classes for residents.
- Engaged member communities and businesses through our outreach program that made contact with over 300 businesses in our region.
- Collected almost 40 tons of hazardous material from 1936 households through our Household Hazardous Waste program. That's almost 25% more households served than last year!
- Our Close the Loop compost program experienced incredible growth and we collected 420 tons of food scraps from businesses, institutions, and residents to be turned into compost.

NWSWD by the Numbers

In the NWSWD, five District operated recycling drop-off sites in Georgia, Montgomery, Bakersfield, St. Albans, and North Hero, two member town run sites (Alburgh and Grand Isle), and mandatory curbside recycling by registered waste haulers allows easy access to recycling for all residents. Overall in 2019, through recycling, reuse and composting, District residents were able to divert 31% of waste created from the landfill! After all of this work the average NWSWD resident sent just 3.3 pounds of waste to the landfill per day. The national average is over 4.5 pounds per day. Way to go!

Through our District operated sites and programs, this year we disposed of 875 tons of trash and recycled or diverted 1,860 tons of material including 595 tons of blue-bin recyclables. This sets the diversion rate for District services at 68%.

Northwest Regional Planning Commission (NRPC) is a multi-purpose governmental organization created by the municipalities of Franklin and Grand kile Countiles, NRPC implements a variety of projects and programs tailored to local, regional and statewide needs. All municipalities in the region are entitled to equal voting representation by two locally appointed members to the Board of Commissioners.

- Provided guidance to the Town Emergency Management Director to update and adopt the Local Emergency Management Plan in compliance with state standards.
- Coordinated substantial revisions to the Georgia Development Regulations in cooperation with the Planning Commission. This project will continue in 2020.
- Consulted with local officials, identified projects and provided technical assistance for Municipal Roads Grants-in-Aid construction projects.
- Updated the E-911 maps.
- Wrote a successful grant application for a road erosion inventory and completed the inventory.
- Completed development of a Transportation Master Plan for the Georgia South Village in coordination with the project consultant, VTrans, and Town of Georgia staff.
- Researched grant funding options for Mill River Road bridge culvert/bridge replacement.
- · Provided planning and zoning technical assistance.
- Drafted a municipal energy plan including the data and maps required by the Vermont Department of Public Service standards.

This year the Commission will assist our member municipalities with Municipal Roads General Permit compliance, water quality project implementation, local energy planning, emergency preparedness, brownfields redevelopment and other needed services. NRPC will implement the new marketing plan for the Missiaquoi Valley Rall Trall and grow the Healthy Roads Collaborative - a local food and farm viability program now coordinated by NRPC. The Commission has no regulatory or taxing authority, however, each year we do request a per capital assessment in support of local and regional activities and to provide matching funds for state and federal programs.

Franklin County Home Health Agency, Inc. Information Sheet Georgia FY 2019

What is Franklin County Home Health Agency?

Franklin County Home Health Agency is a 501(c) 3 non-profit corporation that has proudly provided residents Franklin County with high quality, comprehensive home health, hospice, long term care and wellness services since 1969.

What is the Agency's Mission and Purpose?

We provide high quality health care services in home and community settings. We are committed to excellence. We meet the needs of our clients in a professional manner that promotes health, independence, comfort, dignity and quality of life.

What is the Agency's service area?

The Agency serves all 15 towns in Franklin County through our two offices – one in St. Albans and one in Enosburg Falls. We serve people of all ages.

How many patients did the Agency serve in 2019?

The Agency made a total of 67,415 visits to 2,208 Franklin County residents.

We made the 3,636 visits to 112 residents of Georgia:

How many people does the Agency employ?

The Agency currently has a staff of 170 Registered Nurses, Licensed Practical Nurses, Physical Therapists, Occupational Therapists, Speech-Language Pathologists, Medical Social Workers, Licensed Nursing Assistants, Care Attendants, Homemakers, and Office Support Staff.

What are the Agency's Programs and Services?

Home Care: We provide medically necessary home health services to people of all ages. Examples include individuals who need wound care, a person newly diagnosed with diabetes needing insulin administration and instruction, or a mother and newborn newly discharged from the hospital.

Home Telemonitoring Program: We use state of the art technology to remotely monitor our patients' weight, blood pressure, heart rate and oxygen status to help improve their health condition and avoid hospitalization.

Hospice: We care for people with serious illness for whom the prognosis is less than six months of life. The focus of this care is on achieving comfort and quality of life.

Palliative Care: This program balances advanced medical technology with the wishes of each individual client by focusing on psychological, physical, social and spiritual needs by providing a strong support system to help the client and family cope during the serious illness. This program understands that maintaining quality of life is an important aspect of care.

Long Term Care: We help disabled and older members of our community with personal care, housekeeping, meal preparation, errands and shopping to allow them to stay independent in their own home.

Maternal Child Health Program and Childbirth Education Program: We help to prepare pregnant women for a healthy pregnancy, labor and delivery, breastfeeding and new infant care.

In addition, we offer infusion therapy, foot clinics, grief and be reavement services and wellness services to our community.

How are services paid for?

As a Medicare certified Agency, we receive reimbursement from Medicare, Medicaid and other third party insurances. In 2019 we received 79 percent of our revenue from Medicare and Medicaid.

We are committed to providing medically necessary home care services to all those in need regardless of their ability to pay. Without individual town appropriations and donor gifts, our ability to provide care could be adversely impacted.

Why does the Agency need money from towns?

The Agency depends on the money received from towns to subsidize the cost of care provided to patients who are uninsured or underinsured. Last year the Agency provided more than \$170,190 in free and subsidized care.
